During Darlene's visit she spoke of working with autistic children with sleep disorders and suggested the following. Use cotton sheeting (flannelette) with a low pillow and a lambskin or sheepskin under the sheeting. Tuck in the blankets or doona tightly to give the child a feeling of security.

GIANT STEPS.....

Darlene and her husband spent 10 days in Tasmania in February and she has left many of us committed to the establishment of such a centre. While here, Darlene assessed children, approximately twenty, of whom 12-15 have been accepted into the first intake for when the program begins, most of these will be full time, some part time. Many parents were overwhelmed at what she was able to tell them about their children and very excited at suggestions to try in the interim.

Darlene also interviewed staff, some positions have not yet been finalised. She also met with service club representatives and addressed a public meeting in Deloraine. She spoke to approximately 80 professionals from all parts of the state. She met with the Minister of Education, Mr Beswick MHA and the Secretary of the Department of Community and Health Services, Mr Cleary. She also met with a representative from The Tascare Society who funded part of her airfare here.

Darlene met with many media representatives including the Examiner, Southern Cross, Contact, Sunday Tasmanian and the 7:30 Report. Press coverage was given in the Advocate.

Following on from Darlene's visit an executive committee steering committee were elected at a recent meeting in Deloraine to work towards establishing the centre. Darlene stressed it was necessary to have a commitment from the state government before the centre can operate. If you would like to help, you can write to Mr Beswick, Mr Roger Groom or your new federal member outlining the opportunity we now have and encouraging them to support the concept. Autistic children are entitled to an education that is appropriate. Darlene stressed we have the power support this initiative - lobby your politicians and lets do something positive!!!!!!!

Darlene's commitment to Giant Steps and autistic children is illustrated by the fact that she asked for no payment other than her out of pocket expenses. However the committee are still short of funds to pay outstanding bills. BERYL HAINES AWARD - DR TONY ATTWOOD.....

Note these dates !!!

Dr Tony Attwood will be in Hobart on Monday 14th June (Queens birthday holiday) and Tuesday 15th June to present seminars to parents, professionals and anyone with an interest in Autism.

Dr. Attwood trained as a clinical psychologist in the United Kingdom and was awarded a PhD for his research on the social gestures of autistic children. He has been a practicing clinician in the area of intellectual disability for 17 years. His special interest is the diagnosis of Autism and the development of effective management strategies for the unusual behaviour of such children. He currently works for Intellectual Disability Services in Queensland.

Dr. Attwood spoke at the recent National Autism Conference and those who attended cannot speak highly enough of the material he covered and the quality of his presentation. He is a very captivating public speaker. The program is as follows;
